


The AYJ Fund smiles ... connections ... cures



CHILDHOOD CANCER AWARENESS MONTH

September was Childhood Cancer Awareness Month, and the AYJ Fund committed to GOING GOLD every day. Although gold ribbons for childhood cancer are not as well recognized as pink ribbons for breast cancer, each year we raise awareness to recognize our warriors, survivors and angels and to advance research so one day no other child has to endure what these brave souls and their families do every day.

We were honored to attend our City Council meeting, where North Adams Mayor Jennifer Macksey presented a proclamation recognizing September as Childhood Cancer Awareness Month in the city of North Adams.



If you looked up at her corner office in the evenings, you may also have seen her lights glowing gold to honor children with cancer.

Each day of the month, we honored one of our childhood heroes with social media posts that highlighted each one with a photo. We included a



childhood cancer fact and a way you can help to make a difference for these kids. September 1 was for Anna.

Childhood Cancer Awareness facts included:

- ♥ Five children die each day in the US from childhood cancer.
- ♥ Childhood cancer is the #1 cause of death by disease in the US, and brain tumors are the leading cause of cancer-related death.
- ♥ Somewhere in the world, a child is diagnosed with cancer every two minutes.
- ♥ Every day, 42 kids are diagnosed with cancer in the US.
- Childhood cancer is drastically underfunded.

We participated in five Zoom calls with both of our MA Senators and three of our Representatives' congressional offices to advocate for the Bolstering Research and Innovation Now (BRAIN) Act. This legislation advances the quest to defeat brain tumors by increasing research funding, fostering collaboration, promoting clinical trials and biomarker testing and improving access to care.

AYJ VISIT TO DANA-FARBER CANCER INSTITUTE

It was research day for the AYJ Fund as a group of us visited both the Bandopadhayay and the Filbin Labs at Dana-Farber Cancer Institute in Boston. We met first with Dr. Mimi Bandopadhayay, who updated us on work that her lab is doing on both gliomas and ATRT (another devastating brain tumor). She welcomed us with open arms, and we greeted her growing number of lab members and discussed their research work. It was great to see some lab friends we have met when they attended our AYJ Fund events.

Next we visited Mariella Filbin's Lab, where research on gliomatosis cerebri, funded by the AYJ Fund, is moving forward. During this meeting, we received details on the research work to date and plans for the coming year. The first GC patient has been enrolled into the new maximized therapy protocol, where a patient's tumor samples from different sections of the brain tumor are received right from the OR. The Filbin Lab then conducts single cell RNA sequencing, multiomics and spatial transcriptomics on the samples. This allows the team to compare how the tumor cells grow differently in different parts of the tumor, and in different parts of the brain. This information goes to the molecular tumor board and the best personalized treatments are identified based on individual results.

"This is the first time a patient's tumor has been studied at this depth and we could not have done this without your tremendous support" Mariella Filbin, MD, PhD

BRAINSTORM SUMMIT



Kathy and Joe represented the AYJ Fund in Washington D.C. at the BrainStorm Summit, a conference focused on working

together to advance brain tumor research, to make a difference for brain tumor warriors in the fight and to recognize the angels and support families with their grief. It was an informative and empowering two and a half days together.



The AYJ Fund was proud to be a Bronze Sponsor for the BrainStorm Summit. The program included multiple tracks with sessions focused on research, nonprofit work, quality of life

sessions, bereavement support, and programs for teens and young adults as well as young children.

We attended the research sessions, including Advanced Topics in Cell Metabolism, Immunotherapy Going Viral, Advances in Drug Delivery, New Compounds of Discovery, Advanced Topics in Detection and Monitoring Techniques, and using AI for New Discoveries in Pediatric Brain Cancer. These sessions provided us with information on advances



being made in treatments available through clinical trials and the advances in research in the lab angels, along with speakers. It that are still in development. There is exciting work being done in the CAR-T Cell immunotherapy area, where a patient's own cells are collected and treated in a lab with agents which, when reintroduced back into the body, will attack the patients tumor in a more personalized, focused way. We heard of advances in oncolytic

immunovirotherapy, where a virus is injected directly into a patient's tumor to cause a response that attacks the tumor, and also advances in the use of focused ultrasound to assist in getting the drug to the tumor cells in order to kill them.

There was a presentation on active clinical trials involving liquid biopsies (blood and central nervous system fluids), which provide early identification of



cancer cells demonstrating effectiveness of treatment or to give early notice of a recurrence. It was wonderful to see specialists we know from our GC work presenting on these exciting advances.

There were a number of children present, both fighters and siblings who enjoyed special kid-friendly



programing and creative fun activities. Puppy visits, gaming stations and craft stations kept the children busy. AYJ Fund provided Magic Yarn Project wigs and beanies and super hero cookies made by Lisa Boyer.



The last morning included a breakfast celebration, a poster display, of fighters and

The following two days in Washington, D.C., we spent at CureFest, another impactful, inspiring and emotional





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
